### **ANOTHER GLOSSY LABOR BROCHURE, SAME OLD LABOR LIES**

Labor's obsession with glossy brochures has extended to Opposition - with the same disregard for the truth, NSW Premier Barry O'Farrell said today.

Mr O'Farrell said the NSW Opposition had copied a stunt used the world over by releasing a so-called list of 100 broken promises.

"A simple Google search of "100 broken promises" brings up the same stunt being performed everywhere from the United States and Britain, through to Scotland and Tasmania - it was even tried by one-time NSW Opposition Leader Bob Carr.

"The NSW Labor Party is not only stealing old ideas – but its list of broken promises is full of holes.

"For instance, today I have announced our drunk and disorderly laws will come into force this weekend.

"Yet, on the same day, the Opposition Leader states that we have failed to deliver on the promise.

"Bob Carr tried this stunt when Nick Greiner was in office - the only difference is that he probably did his homework better than John Robertson."

Mr O'Farrell said the Government was delivering all its key election commitments including:

- Abolishing Labor's corrupt Part 3A of the Planning Act
- Building the North West Rail Link
- Improving the Pacific and Princes Highways
- Recruiting more police, nurses and teachers
- Cleaning up the lobbying laws
- Introducing payroll rebates to create more jobs
- Scrapping Labor's homebuyers tax
- Shutting down 24 speed cameras identified as revenue raisers
- Attracting major events back to NSW including the Bledisloe Cup, Tiger Woods and the Davis Cup.

Mr O'Farrell said that, rather than producing glossy brochures, the Labor Party should be lobbying the Federal Government to provide more infrastructure funds for NSW.

"The NSW Labor Party never learns - the public is sick of these stunts," he said.

"They want to see more rail lines, better roads, new hospitals and extra police stations – and that is exactly what we are delivering."
