The Board of Fire Commissioners of N.S.W. presents its report for the year 1945, in pursuance of section 19 (2) of the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-1944; being the thirty-sixth annual

FIRE BRIGADES (AMENDMENT) ACTS, 1941 AND 1944.

The commencement of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1941, which extended the application of the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-27 to Port Jackson, the Port of Newcastle, Port Kembla and any other navigable waters to which the Board, with the consent of the Minister, may, by notification in the Gazette, apply the Act, has not yet been proclaimed.

By Proclamation in the Government Gazette of 31st August, 1945, the Lieutenant-Governor appointed the day next following the signing of the Armistice at Tokio as the "appointed day" for the purposes of section 2 of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944. The "appointed day" thus became the 3rd September. the 3rd September.

The application of the provisions of the Act to the fire rvice is later referred to under the heading of Standard

#### BOARD.

The personnel of the Board remained the same as that of the previous year.

A notice was published in Government Gazette of the 19th October, fixing the 22nd November as nomination day for the triennial elections of members to the Board. The elections will be held on the 26th February, 1946.

Mr. Henry Mayo Webb relinquished active duty as Secretary and Executive Officer of the Board on the 31st January, prior to retirement. The Board placed on record its appreciation of the outstanding ability, loyalty and devotion to duty which were characteristic of his services through forty-five years' association with the Fire Service of New South Wales. Mr. Webb was appointed Secretary on 22nd October, 1914, and from 1st January, 1927, occupied the position of Secretary and Executive Officer. and Executive Officer.

Mr. Albert L. Stark, Chief Clerk, who joined the Board's service on 5th November, 1909, was appointed Secretary.

#### ESTIMATES OF EXPENDITURE.

For the maintenance of the fire services in the various fire districts throughout the State, the estimates of expenditure adopted for the year 1945 totalled £563,724, as shown in Appendix II. The estimate in respect of the Sydney Fire District was £439,880, while those of the one hundred and thirty other fire districts amounted to £123,844.

Contributions were received from one hundred and twenty. six insurance companies and forty-six firms, and which represented 16.76 per cent. of the amount of premiums in respect of the Sydney Fire District.

The number of contributory Municipal and Shire Councils in the Sydney Fire District was fifty-five. The percentage of their total contributions for 1945 to that of the assessed annual value of all ratable property returned by them in 1944 was 5/9.2; while for 1946 the contributions by the Councils will be equivalent to 7/1.2 per £100 of the assessment in accordance with the returns of values furnished in 1945 which totalled £38,637,143, an increase of £570,085.

The estimates for the year 1946 amount to £688,712, an increase of £124,988. That for the Sydney Fire District is £549,036, and for the one hundred and thirty-two other fire districts £139,676.

The area of the Sydney Fire District is 297.65 square miles.

#### FIRE DISTRICTS-ADDITIONS AND ALTERATIONS.

Fire Districts—Additions and Alterations.

By Notification published in Government Gazette of the 20th July, the provisions of the Fire Brigades Act were applied by the Board, with the consent of the Minister, to a further part of the Shire of Baulkham Hills, viz., Castle Hill, and the boundaries of the Sydney Fire District were altered and extended by grouping the area in question in the Sydney Fire District. By Notifications in the Gazette of the 28th September, the boundaries of the Cronulla and Sutherland Fire Districts were extended to include additional parts of the Shire of Sutherland, viz., Taren Point and Woronora respectively. By Notification published in the Gazette of the 21st September, the Act was applied to the townships of Beresfield, Hexham, Tarro and Thornton within the Shire of Lower Hunter and such constituted the Lower Hunter Fire District, and by Proclamation published in the Gazette of the Beresheld, Hexham, Tarro and Thornton within the Shire of Lower Hunter and such constituted the Lower Hunter Fire District, and by Proclamation published in the Gazette of the 12th October, the Act was also applied to the town of St. Marys within the Municipality of St. Marys and such constituted the St. Marys Fire District. Three further parts of the Shire of Lake Macquarie were brought within the provisions of the Act by Notifications in the Gazettes of 5th and 12th October, whereby the boundaries of the Belmont Fire District were extended to include Blacksmiths and Pelican Flat, those of the Cardiff Fire District to embrace Young Wallsend and similarly the boundaries of the Charlestown Fire District to incorporate Dudley, Gateshead and Whitebridge; also, vide Government Gazettes dated 19th January and 12th October, the Act was applied to two further parts of the Shire of Kearsley whereby the boundaries of the Kurri Kurri Fire District were extended and the townships of Crawford and Millfield were embraced in the Paxton Fire District. The Act was also applied by Notification in Gazette of 27th July to an additional area of the Shire of Central Illawarra, viz., a further part of the township of Mount St. Thomas and such area was grouped in the Wollongong Fire District.

By reason of the foregoing, the number of Fire Districts was increased from one hundred and thirty-one to one hundred and thirty-three.

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#### INCREASE OF STATUTORY LIMIT.

In order to maintain the efficiency of the fire services at In order to maintain the efficiency of the fire services at Armidale, Broken Hill, Casino, Cessnock, Dubbo, Glen Innes, Hillston, Inverell, Lithgow, Maitland and West Wallsend and to establish a Brigade at St. Marys, the consent of the Minister was obtained to the statutory limit of one-fourth of a penny in the pound on the Unimproved Capital Value of all ratable land in the respective fire districts being exceeded, at the request of the Councils concerned and in pursuance of Section 34 of the Act.

#### FIRE STATIONS AND SITES.

Negotiations are proceeding in connection with making a site available to the Board at the southern approach of the Sydney Harbour Bridge in substitution for the Board's pro-perty at Cumberland Street and in replacement of the Circular Quay Fire Station.

Applications under the Real Property Act have been made in respect of the Paddington Fire Station property, the freehold of which was recently acquired from the Metropolitan Water, Sewerage and Drainage Board and the new site for a Station at Griffith. To meet the wishes of the Mullumbimby Council a new site for a fire station was made available by the Crown in substitution for the site previously held by the Board. Portion of the Bondi Fire Station site was sold.

Building operations have been restricted to making adjust-ents in regard to accommodation for officers and firemen ments in at certain fire stations consequent upon a re-allocation of the

#### LEASES.

The lease of the Werris Creek Fire Station was renewed for 10 years; that at Murrurundi for 7 years; those at Cronulla, Ettalong, Malabar and Toronto for 5 years; Gundagai and Guyra for 3 years; Gulgong and Rydalmere for 2 years; and Cabramatta for 1 year. The agreement in respect of the Morpeth site was continued for 1 year and the tenancy in respect of the Workshops premises at Croydon was also extended.

In Sydney and Suburbs 5,950 alarms of fire were recorded during the year, being a decrease of 2,044 compared with the previous year. Of this number 1,679 were false alarms, 72 chimney fires and 4,199 other fires. The number of malicious false alarms was 711, needless 276 and accidental 692. Thirty-six fires were classified as suspicious in origin as compared with 28 in 1044. as compared with 38 in 1944.

The most notable fires were:-

March-Lord Street, Botany, F. W. Hughes Pty. Ltd., wool scourers.

23rd November—74-78 Wentworth Avenue, City, P. and R. Williams Pty. Ltd. and others, motor sales and engineers.

In the case of a furniture factory fire at 85 Derwent Street, Glebe, on 9th March, the Board has to record, with regret, the death of Second-Class Fireman Alexander V. Mancy as a result of coming into contact with electric wires.

Although a fire in a dressing room at the Tivoli Theatre, Sydney, which occurred on 1st September, was not extensive, there were unfortunately associated with it the deaths of two girls and severe burns and shock to a third girl.

In the Country Fire Districts the number of fire calls received by the Brigades was 2,368, being a decrease of 1,334 by comparison with that of the previous year.

The most notable fire was:

17th March—Hill and Watson Streets, Molong, Sydney Flour Milling Co. Pty. Ltd., flour millers.

Fourteen (14) fires were classified as suspicious in origin. The year was marked by an unusual loss of life associated with outbreaks of fire; fatalities occurred at Auburn, Balmain, Bexley, Bowral, Fairfield, Harbord, Murwillumbah, Petersham, and Whale Beach.

The Board appreciates the services rendered by personnel from the Armed Forces and the Police in subduing bush fires.

#### ELECTRICAL—FIRE ALARMS.

Four additional street fire alarms were installed at Lakemba, Manly, Parramatta and Waterloo, making a total in Sydney and Suburbs of 751, while there are in addition 96 special alarms. Connected to the various fire stations are 537 sprinkalarms. Connected to the various are stations are 537 sprink-ler installations of the Grinnell type, 206 of the Central, 15 of the Phoenix, 2 of the Globe, 6 of the Star, 10 of the Grimes, 1 of the Clarke-Vigilant and 1 of the Tate. There are also 5 Thermostatic alarms of the Kirkby type, 5 of the Vigilant, 52 of the Reichel, 89 of the May-Oatway and 240 private fire alarms.

In the Country Fire Districts one additional telephone fire alarm was provided at Port Kembla, making the total of telephone fire alarms 247, mechanical alarms 166 and special alarms 29. Twenty-three sprinkler installations are connected to the fire stations at Newcastle, 3 at Bathurst, 2 at Broken Hill, 1 at Tamworth, 2 at West Maitland, 8 at Liverpool and 2 at Wagga Wagga. Three thermostatic fire alarms of the May-Oatway type are installed at Broken Hill and 5 at Newcastle with 3 Reichel, also 1 at West Maitland; while 189 private fire alarms are in communication with various country fire stations. fire stations.

Seven additional fire alarm pillars were provided in the Sydney Fire District and 3 in the Country Districts, making the total number of pillars now installed 545 and 182 respec-

#### THEFTS AND DAMAGE.

Interference with street fire alarms and thefts of parts of instruments continued, thus endangering life and property in ease of fire. The localities affected include City of Sydney, Arncliffe, Auburn, Bankstown, Bexley, Bondi, Burwood, Circular Quay, Concord, Darlinghurst, Drummoyne, Eastwood, Enfield, George Street West, Gladesville, Glebe, Grafton, Granville, Guildford, Hamilton, Homebush, Kogarah, Lakemba, Leichhardt, Lidcombe, Lithgow, Manly, Maroubra, Mascot, Mittagong, Mortdale, Mudgee, New Lambton, Newtown, Oatley, Paddington, Parramatta, Pyrmont, Randwick, Redfern, Rozelle, Stanmore, Stockton, St. Peter's, Waverley, Wentworthville, West Maitland, West Wallsend and Weston.

#### OFFENCES AND CONVICTIONS.

At Bulli a man was fined for leaving a fire unattended. At Toronto a man was fined for having started a fire on vacant land in contravention of the National Security Regulations, and a fine was imposed on a man who was also bound over for two years for maliciously damaging a shed by fire at Penrith. For transmitting false alarms of fire to the Wagga Wagga and Woy Woy Brigades, convictions were obtained and fines imposed. The Court convicted seven youths for maliciously setting fire to a Tramway Shed at Mortlake, bound them over for two years and ordered the payment of damages.

#### BRIGADE.

The Board had under consideration for some time a plan for the reorganisation of the Fire Service in the Sydney Fire District, the object of which was to increase efficiency by a re-allocation of personnel, having regard to changes which had occurred over many years in the character and situation of fire risks, the more modern and efficient fire-fighting appliances and equipment available, vastly improved road conditions and other similar factors. A further development of the scheme requires the erection of additional stations in specially selected localities; a new station at the southern end of the Sydney Harbour Bridge, new central stations at Paddington-Woollahra and Auburn-Granville on the Parramatta Road, also new stations at Bankstown and Earlwood are thus foreshadowed. The Board had under consideration for some time a plan foreshadowed.

The Order of the Industrial Commission for a substantial reduction in the hours of duty of Officers and Firemen in terms of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, at a time when the manpower position was such that recruits were not available to maintain the existing strength of the Brigade, accelerated the implementation of the plan. Thereupon from the 21st September the Board put into effect the first part of the plan which involved the closing of certain fire stations and the concentration of staff at other locations to synchronise with the introduction of the new roster of hours for all permanent firemen later referred to in this report.

Accordingly the undermentioned fire stations were closed:—Alexandria, Arneliffe, Annandale, Bexley, Chatswood, Canterbury, Enfield, Five Dock, Granville, Homebush, Hunter's Hill, Harbord, Mascot, Mortdale, Maroubra, North Sydney, Pyrmont, Ryde, Rozelle, St. Peter's, Vaucluse, Woollahra and Waverley.

Additional to the re-allocation of staff effected by the closing of these stations, the reduction in hours of duty involved promotions in the various ranks of officers and the appointment promotions in the various ranks of officers and the appointment of further recruits to the Brigade; the authorised strength in the Sydney Fire District thus became 149 officers, 754 permanent firemen (an increase of 7 officers and 130 firemen), 268 volunteer and 442 reserve firemen; in the Greater Newcastle Fire District 12 officers, 39 permanent firemen (an increase of 2 officers and 7 firemen), 115 volunteer and 38 reserve firemen, and in Maitland 1 officer, 3 permanent firemen (an increase of 2 firemen), 49 volunteer and 25 reserve firemen. At Broken Hill there are 3 officers, 7 permanent firemen, 16 volunteer and 12 reserve firemen, and in the other country districts 38 officers, 1,379 volunteer and 564 reserve firemen. Officers have replaced permanent firemen where such were stationed in country districts other than those abovementioned. those abovementioned.

The Jerilderie and Wingham Volunteer Fire Brigades operated as from the 1st January. New Brigades were established in the Lower Hunter and St. Mary's Fire Districts pending the provision of full services on the 1st January, 1946; also at Castle Hill in substitution for that at Baulkham

The Women's Fire Auxiliary and the Auxiliary Reserve Corps, established as a war-time emergency measure, were disbanded. The Board placed on record its appreciation of the services rendered during the war by the members of these units and tendered a farewell function to them in recognition

#### DEATHS.

In addition to the death of Second Class Fireman A. V. Mancy, previously referred to, the Board records with regret the decease of Senior Fireman W. A. Thoms; Volunteer Firemen E. Gerstenberg (Condobolin), A. V. Corby (Goulburn), Captain T. Tuckett (Homeville), Volunteer Firemen E. C. Shepherd (Tighe's Hill), R. W. Warbrooke (Tweed Heads), W. E. Jarvis (Weston); Reserve Firemen K. D. Pigott (Goulburn), and A. Armstrong (Wentworth), also J. Smith, Workshops.

#### SUPERANNUATION AND RETIREMENTS.

Nine hundred and twenty-seven (927) employees contributed in respect of pensions under the Superannuation Act.

#### FIRE APPLIANCES.

No new motor fire engines were placed in commission during the year, although delivery of fire engine chassis ordered during the war period is now proceeding.

Additional motor fire engines were installed at Cootamundra and Wagga Wagga. Changes in appliances were effected at Albury, Bega, Braidwood, Cooma, Dapto, Ettalong, Guyra, Hillston, Leura, Manilla, Moss Vale, Mudgee, Narrandera, Nyngan, Temora, Walgett and Windsor.

#### HOSE.

Delivery of fire hose from England was restricted to 1-inch unlined hose, 5,000 ft. of which was received.

#### CLOTHING AND BOOT FACTORIES.

The manufacture of uniform clothing and boots for the fire service continued satisfactorily.

#### INSPECTIONS OF BUILDINGS.

Fire Brigade Officers regularly inspected Theatres and Public Halls registered under the Theatres and Public Halls Act and premises under the Factories and Shops Act and the Height of Buildings Act. The inspections of institutions, business premises, hospitals, etc., were extended and drill and instruction imparted to the staffs in Sydney and country. Concourse duty was continued at places of public assembly.

#### WAR.

Hostilities in the European zone terminated on V.E. Day, proclaimed as 8th May, and in the Pacific area on V.P. Day, proclaimed as the 15th August.

#### BUSH FIRES.

The Bush and Rural Fire Prevention Order (No. 2) of 1944 was amended and re-applied in October and ordered to be observed until 31st March, 1946.

Arising out of the extensive bush fires which occurred in the early part of the year, the Board conferred with the Bush Fires Advisory Committee and the Local Governing Authorities concerned; as a result of which the services of a Senior Officer were made available to organise and re-establish Bush Fire Brigades on the Blue Mountains and other Districts to operate under the authority of the Councils in areas outside the Board's jurisdiction but in co-operation with the services established by the Board.

#### WORKERS' COMPENSATION ACT.

One hundred and twenty-five (125) claims were lodged under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act with the Government Insurance Office of New South Wales, with which the Board again covered its liability.

INDUSTRIAL ARBITRATION ACT-Re BASIS OF RATES OF WAGES AND SALARIES FOR EMPLOYEES.

During the year, variations the weighted average of the Retail Price Index Numbers for the five towns in this State on which the Needs Basic Wage for Government Employees is calculated left such Needs Basic Wage at the end of year at £4 12s. 0d. (i.e., a reduction of 1s. since January, 1945) with which was payable the fixed loading of 5s. applicable to such employees, a total of £4 17s. 0d.

As a result of such variations, the salaries and wages payable under the Industrial Agreement with the New South Wales Fire Brigade Officers' Association, the Fire Brigade Employees (State) Award and the Industrial Agreement with the Federated Clerks' Union were reduced by 1s. from the commencement of the first pay period in February.

The Needs Basic Wage (based on the Index Numbers for Sydney) for other employees of the Board, subject to general State and Federal Awards (other than the Federal Clothing Trades' Award) was reduced by 1s. from the commencement of the first pay period in May, but increased by 1s. from the same date in November and consequently at the end of the year it remained at £4 13s. 0d. In addition the fixed loading of 6s. was payable throughout the year.

The wages payable under the Federal Clothing Trades Award (based on the Index numbers for the six capital cities of Australia) were not affected.

#### FIREMEN'S REFUSAL OF DUTY.

Arising out of the Judgment of the Industrial Commission on the 9th February a stop-work meeting was held by the permanent firemen on the following day but terminated that afternoon. On the 11th idem resulting from the suspension of a fireman at Stanmore for refusal to carry out certain clerical duties, a strike ensued of all permanent firemen throughout the State. The Board gave the specified notification under regulation 10 of the National Security (Industrial Peace) Regulations and on the 13th February the matter, after consideration and argument in the Commonwealth Arbitration Court, was remitted to the Industrial Commission of New South Wales. Compulsory conferences were ordered, presided over by Mr. Justice Taylor, at which representatives of the New South Wales Fire Brigades Officers' Association were present and made certain offers and suggestions toward undertaking the duties in dispute for the time being which materially assisted the settlement which was reached on the 14th February and the firemen then returned to duty in accordance with their rosters. During the period of the strike Fire Brigade officers remained on or returned to duty.

### STANDARD HOURS.

### FIRE BRIGADES (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1944.

On the 9th February the Industrial Commission announced that on that day, but for the effect of amendments of the National Security (Economic Organisation) Regulations, it would have delivered its judgment on the application by the Fire Brigades Association of New South Wales for a 56-hour week and overtime and read the proposed independ week and overtime and read the proposed judgment.

In consequence, however, of the procedure introduced by In consequence, however, of the procedure introduced by the amendment to the Regulations, the judgment was not delivered until 20th March. The effect of such judgment was, that until the date appointed by the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, for the reduction of working hours for firemen throughout the State to an average of fifty-six per week, overtime payment should be made to firemen when on duty in excess of an average of sixty-three hours per week, as follows: (a) at ordinary rates up to an average of seventy-eight hours per week; (b) at time and one half from an average of seventy-eight hours to an average of eighty hours per week; and (c) at double time thereafter.

This order was made operative retrospectively from the 9th February.

In preparing to bring into effect as from the "appointed y" the reduction of hours for firemen and officers required In preparing to bring into effect as from the "appointed day" the reduction of hours for firemen and officers required by the Act, the Board had approved of the introduction of a 56-hour week roster on a system of three shifts per day for firemen, but when the "appointed day" was proclaimed, under the provisions of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, to be the 3rd September, the Fire Brigades Association expressed dissatisfaction with such roster, the grounds of such dissatisfaction including questions as to the interpretation of section 27A of the Act. In consequence, on 31st August, the Industrial Commission, adjourning legal argument on such interpretation until a later date, ordered, as an interim measure, that as from the "appointed day" the average ordinary working hours per week of firemen would be fifty-six and that until further order the roster system in operation prior to the "appointed day" and which provided for seventy-eight hours per week, would continue to be worked, but that the overtime order of the 20th March would be altered so that overtime would be payable as from fifty-six hours instead of sixty-three hours.

The Commission also ordered that the hours of officers up to and including the rank of Station Officer in accordance with the provisions of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, would be 168 hours in fourteen consecutive days with provision for overtime and for which the Board proposed to introduce the two-platoon roster which had applied previously to firemen when hours of duty were an average of 84 per week.

As a result of conferences which took place prior to the date fixed by the Commission for hearing argument on the interpretation of section 27a, new rosters for officers and firemen were agreed to, with modifications of the overtime provisions to provide for payment at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours in excess of the standard hours fixed and at the rate of double time thereafter. Such new rosters came into operation on the 21st September, at 8 a.m., and formed the basis for the new awards for officers and firemen referred to elsewhere in this report, but which have not yet been finalised. yet been finalised.

The firemen's roster provides for three platoons; the rota of hours over six days being—two day shifts of ten hours each, two night shifts of fourteen hours each followed by forty-eight hours off duty; the cycle repeating for six weeks.

The officer's roster is on the basis of twenty-four hours on and twenty-four hours off; the hours of duty averaging eighty-four over a cycle of two weeks,

#### Re FIRE BRIGADES EMPLOYEES (STATE) AWARD. LOG OF CLAIMS 1943-5.

The decision of the Industrial Commission on hours and overtime as previously mentioned was delivered on 20th March. Questions of interpretation arising on the settlement of the minutes of the Order were referred to the Industrial Commission by the Industrial Registrar and Judgment thereon was delivered on 24th May delivered on 24th May.

Subsequently, a separate application was made by the Fire Brigades Association in pursuance of the National Security (Economic Organisation) Regulations for a finding that the margin between the rates of pay of a first-class fireman and a senior fireman when compared with the margins between the rates of lower ranks were too low, were therefore anomalous rates of lower ranks were too low, were therefore anomalous and should be increased. Judgment was reserved and delivered on the 6th September when the Commission found that no anomaly was established and dismissed the application.

The hearing of the balance of the log of claims for the new award was continued on the 20th, 21st and 22nd August, and reserved judgment was delivered on the 6th September.

In addition to incorporating the new hours and overtime provisions ordered in consequence of the commencement of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, the Judgment inter alia eliminated the war loading, granted long service leave as a condition of employment and increased the meal allowance to 2s. 6d.

#### WAR LOADING.

In its Judgment of 6th September on the Fire Brigades Association's application for a new Award, the Commission found expressly that the conditions on which a War Loading had been granted in 1941 no longer existed, and stated therefore that the new award would not contain a war loading.

The Fire Brigades Association later made an application for the Commission to review its Judgment in this respect, on the ground that the Commission had exceeded its jurisdiction in making such an Order. This application was listed for hearing on 17th December, and the Commission upheld the Association's submission and amended its earlier Judgment and Order by deleting all references to War Leading. It added Association's submission and amended its earlier Judgment and Order by deleting all references to War Loading. It added that a prima facie case had been established by the Board for removal of the war loading, and that a statement accordingly would be sent to the Chief Judge of the Commonwealth Arbitration Court. Pending the decision of the Chief Judge on such statement, the manner in which the Association's application would be dealt with was stood over. The Board therefore resumed payment of the war loading restrospectively to the date of the Court's prior Judgment.

# Fire Brigade Officers' Association—Application for New Award, 1945.

New Award, 1945.

On the 5th January the New South Wales Fire Brigades Officers' Association filed a log of claims for an award for Officers in the employ of the Board. The rates of pay and conditions of employment for such Officers had in the past been provided for by Board's Order or by agreement and, since 1941, by an Industrial agreement. Approval of the Chief Judge of the Commonwealth Arbitration Court having been obtained in pursuance of the National Security (Economic Organisation) Regulations, the hearing by the Industrial Commission of the log of claims as to hours and overtime commenced on 23rd May and continued on 8th and 9th August when judgment was reserved. Following the Proclamation of the commencement of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, interim orders were made in regard to hours and overtime. and Judgment by the Full Bench was given on 5th October. October.

October.

The Commission ordered that the ordinary hours of officers up to and including the rank of District Officer should be an average of 92 per week retrospectively as from 9th February with overtime at ordinary rates between 92 and 112 hours in the Sydney and Newcastle Fire Districts and between 92 and 138 hours in other Country Districts. However, in accordance with the interim order by the Commission on 31st August, as from 3rd September to give effect to the provisions of the Fire Brigades (Amendment) Act, 1944, the ordinary hours were to be an average of 84 per week with overtime payable at the rate of time and a half for the first 4 hours in excess of that number and double time thereafter.

The Board subsequently conceded that the average ordinary

The Board subsequently conceded that the average ordinary weekly hours for Inspectors should be 84.

The Board also decided to observe a similar average of 84 hours, in principle, for Senior Officers, and to implement this decision created two new senior ranks, viz., Fifth and Sixth Officers.

#### Re MAINTENANCE OFFICERS.

In December the Board was served with a Notice of Application by the New South Wales Fire Brigades Officers' Association for an award for its members employed in the Board's Workshops and Electrical and Building Maintenance Departments. This application has not yet been listed for hearing by the Industrial Commission.

#### FEDERATED CLERKS' UNION.

A new Industrial Agreement governing the salaries and conditions of service of members of the clerical staff was entered into by the Board with the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, New South Wales Branch, for a period of three years from 1st June.

# CARELESS USE OF FIRES ACT, 1912.

The regulations under the Careless Use of Fires Act were amended by the addition of a new regulation (No. 2) published in Government Gazette of 29th March.

#### INSPECTIONS.

Members of the Board visited and inspected fire stations in Sydney and Country Districts during which long-service medals and bars were presented to members of the permanent staff and volunteer firemen. Matters of fire brigade interest were discussed with representatives of the Municipal and Shire Councils concerned. Councils concerned.

#### LOANS.

One debenture of £2,500 was redeemed in respect of each of the two loans of £50,000 by the A.M.P. Society of 1928 and 1937, and one debenture of £5,000 and £1,000 respectively in connection with the loan of £100,000 and £20,000 of 1941.

AUDIT.

A satisfactory report of the accounts of the Board was received from the Auditors, Messrs. Robertson, Crane & Gibbons.

#### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, the Board acknowledges with thanks and appreciation the co-operation of the Explosives Department, Labour and Industry and Social Services Department, Maritime Services Board, Metropolitan Water, Sewerage and Drainage Board, Police Department, Postmaster-General's Department, Department of Road Transport and Tramways and the Valuer-General's Department.
