

OF THE

SYDNEY HARBOUR TRUST COMMISSIONERS,

FOR THE:

YEAR ENDED 30th JUNE, 1920.

Sydney Harbour Trust Offices, Circular Quay, 1st October, 1920.

THE Sydney Harbour Trust Commissioners have the honor to submit to the Honorable the Colonial Treasurer, for presentation to Parliament, their Report for the year ended 30th June, 1920.

Receipts.—The Revenue collected during the year amounted to £658,313 Is. 7d.

Revenue Expenditure.—Working expenditure, including the Commissioners' salaries, amounted to £180,458 2s. 11d.

Renewals and Replacements.—The amount expended under this head was £19,992 0s. 3d., which has been charged against the surplus.

Capital Expenditure.—The outlay from Loan Votes during the year amounted to £268,054 7s. 11d.

Capital Debt.—The Capital Debt at 30th June amounted to £8,959,886 12s. 5d.

Interest.—The interest on Capital Debt for the year amounted to £353,037 3s. 6d.

Surplus.—The surplus for the year's transactions, after deducting £19,992 0s. 3d. for renewals and replacements, amounted to £98,825 14s. 11d.

Gross Revenue shows a return of 746 per cent. on Capital as compared with 721 per cent. for the previous year. Net Revenue, 534 per cent. against 534 per cent. for the previous year. Net Surplus, 112 per cent. against 119 per cent. in the previous year.

The ratio of working expenses (excluding interest and renewals) to gross revenue is 28'32 per cent., against 25'82 per cent. for the previous year.

Tonnage of the Port.—During the year ended 30th June, 1920, the total number of vessels entering the port was 7,545, with a gross registered tonnage of 9,936,428, and a net tonnage of 5,803,381 showing an increase in comparison with the previous year of 46 vessels, and an increase in gross tonnage of 1,130,338.

Imported goods also showed an increase over the previous year, being 3,427,486 tons as against 3,410,203 tons for the year ended 30th June, 1919.

The value of goods imported from all sources was £75,912,824 as against £68,752,977 for the previous year.

The value of oversea exports, exclusive of gold, was £51,848,000, as compared with £17,132,019 for the year ended 30th June, 1919.

Construction of Works.—During the period under review the Commissioners expended the sum of £268,054 in carrying out improvements to the port.

The main port roadway has not yet been carried through the Gas-works on account of the continued inability of the Company to hand over the property. It is hoped, however, that this very necessary work will not be much longer delayed.

"Work has been continued on the wharfage at Globe Island in connection with the scheme for bulk-handling of wheat.

Dredging.—Good progress has been made in dredging the original bottom of the Western Channel, which has now a depth of 40 feet at low-water ordinary spring tide for a varying width up to 700 feet. It is anticipated that in a few months' time the width carrying a depth of 40 feet will be sufficiently uniform to render the channel safely usable by the larger vessels entering the port. The Eastern Channel will then be available for out-going vessels only.

The quantity of material dredged by the various dredges during the year was 1,345,287 tons.

Ferry Services.—During the year the number of passengers carried by the various services was 40,930,513 as against 36,310,694 during the previous year.

The Commissioners desire to place on record their appreciation of the services rendered by the staff during the year.

REPORT OF THE ACTING ENGINEER IN-CHIEF FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE, 1920.

I forwa d herewith, for the information of the Commissioners, a report upon the works carried out by the Engineering Branch during the financial year 1919-20.

The enormous increases in post-war prices of materials and in wages have combined to curtail the amount of work it was hoped, at the beginning of the year, to carry out for the allotted expenditure.

The stoppage of cement supplies unfortunately caused the cessation of certain works, notably the Pottinger-street Viaduct, which is now only 30 per cent. completed. This work has been arrested on three separate occasions.

Delays, amounting to actual stoppages, in the supply of timber for wharf construction, particularly

in the case of piles, have very seriously retarded progress.

The construction works carried out during the year were mainly confined to the completion of the Glebe Island Wharfage to enable the bulk grain handling plant to be erected, and to the pushing forward of NOS. 2, 3, 4, and 5 Berths, and the extension and improvement of No. 10 Berth, Walsh Bay. A berth was commenced at Johnston's Bay for the storage of copra and other hazardous goods, and consideration was given to the question of landing coal for domestic purposes and for a new berth for landing coal into vessels for bunkering and export.

A large amount of maintenance work was carried out. This was rendered necessary by the age of

many of the wharves and cargo sheds.

Extensive dredging operations were continued in Johnston's Bay towards opening up a wide channel to the terminal grain elevator at Glebe Island. Three ladder dredges were at times engaged Three ladder dredges were at times engaged on this work.

The dredging of the Eastern channel was pushed on without interruption by means of the suction dredge "Triton," which has proved herself a most valuable acquisition. The Western channel has been cut through to a depth of 40 feet for a width varying from a 150 feet to 700 feet. With careful buoying H.M.S. "Renown" could have navigated this channel both inwards and outwards, but it was not deemed advisable to take her through on account of the steepness of the present sandbanks on either side, which might possibly have fallen in owing to the drag of the water which would have been caused by so large a vessel passing through so narrow a channel.

The Trust's dredges, tugs, and barges, were maintained in a condition of efficiency. The suction dredge "Poseidon" which was working in the Parramatta River near Homebush Bay, was put out of commission for the present, and is now under repair so that she may be available whenever needed.

The ladder dredge "Nereus," which has been laid up for some time, is now being overhauled to take the place of the old and obsolete ladder dredge "Charon."

A considerable amount of submarine rock excavation was carried out during the year at Jones Bay Walsh Bay. This was necessary to secure the full depth of 35 feet at L.W.O.S.T. at the extreme and at Walsh Bay. inshore ends of the jetties.

Berths 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, and 7, Woolloomooloo Bay, were dredged to 35 feet at L.W.O.S.T.

A new motor launch, the "Nereid," for the use of the Wharf Construction Branch, was designed and built to take the place of the "Helen," now worn out after 18 years continuous service.

Maintenance of roadways and streets within the Trust's area has been difficult, on account of the variable and often inferior quality of pitch that has been obtainable during the past few years.

The following is a summary of the principal works carried out during the year:—

WHARF CONSTRUCTION, &C.

Nos. 2 and 3 Berths, Walsh Bay.—144 squares of jetty have been added during the year, making total length of jetty completed 525 feet by 130 feet wide. Great difficulty bas been experienced in obtaining suitable piles for this work.

About 11,000 cubic yards of ballast have been tipped under the centre of the jetty for the purpose

of stiffening wharf piles.

Nos. 4 and 5 Berths, Walsh Bay.—Work was commenced during the latter part of the year on raising the subsided portion of this jetty—an area of about 120 feet by 90 feet of the high-level portion has been raised to correct height.

About 2,000 cubic yards of ballast have been tipped under the centre of the jetty for the purpose

of stiffening wharf piles,

New Pottinger Street.—The portion of Roadway leading from Hickson road to the concrete viaduct section has been completed, about 1,420 square yards of tarred macadam having been laid. About 426 square yards of asphalted footpath has also been completed. 2,146 cubic yards of rock, and 1,537 cubic yards of soil have been excavated at the Windmill-street end. Work on concrete viaduct section was commenced, but had to be stopped during the latter part of the year owing to the cement shortage. Three bays were constructed, giving a total length of 300 feet.

Forms and steelwork have been completed for three bays of the mezanine floor.

The concreting of ground floor has been completed, covering an area of 275 square yards; 260 lineal feet of retiming wall and portion of the concrete abutment have been completed, about 835 cubic

yards of concrete being used.

Glebe, Island Wharfage.—Raising Deck Level.—Work in connection with the raising of the deck to suit wheat loading has been completed, 382 squares of wharf having been raised.

Eighty two bays of dwarf wall have been completed, taking 275 cubic yards of concrete, leaving

only 12 bays to finish.

Extension of Wharf.—The wharf has been extended 570 feet, or 274 squares.

There still remains 9 bays of trestle sea-wall and 45 bays of dwarf concrete wall on top of trestles to complete, owing to cement shortage.

The extension, together with raised portion of the wharf, now gives a berth 1,740 feet long.

New Copra Wharf.—Work was commenced during the latter part of the year to provide a wharf and sheds for storage of copra. About 1,410 cubic yards of rock and soil were excavated preparing the site. Extension

Extension No. 10, Walsh Bay—Work was commenced during the lat'er part of the year, extending this berth 100 feet by 110 feet wide.

Six bays of piles hare been driven, and caps and girders fitted on five bays.

Extension No. 12 Berth, Woollomooloo (Metal. Wharf).—This work, which was commence and completed during the year, consisted of sheet piling and reclamation. About 90 feet of sheet piling were driven, and 3,000 cubic yards of reclamation carried out.

Piles for carrying metal hoppers were driven.

Extension Xo. 11 Berth, Woolloomooloo, 130 feet by 40 feet.—Work was commenced in extending this berth. Portion of the northern end of the old wharf was partly demolished, and a ramp constructed 57 feet 6 inches long by 40 feet wide, grading from R.L. 9 feet to R.L. 13.5 feet. The majority of holes have been drilled for the piles for the 130 feet extension. Work was delayed pending the removal of metal bins on No. 12 berth.

Manly Cargo Wharf, Manly—During the year this wharf was widened by 30 feet for total length, approximately 340 feet.

Roslyn Gardens Wharf, Middle Harbour.—The old ferry wharf at Roslyn Gardens was reconstructed to provide a berth for road metal for the Public Works Department in connection with the Northern Suburbs outfall sewer. About 10½ squares have been added to wharf, and road metal bins 50 feet 9 inches long by 21 feet 3 inches wide by 19 feet high have been erected. Capacity of bins, 350 tons.

Slewart Street, Manly Cargo Wharf.—This berth has been widened for Port Jackson and Manly Steamship Company, Ltd., to provide additional wharf area. About 26 squares of wharf have been added.

Glebe Island Quarry.—Work in this quarry has been hampered on account of having to shoot light and at times to suspend shooting while concreting was taking place at the wheat silos adjacent to quarry. Total amount of rock excavated for the year. 66,913 cubic yards. Explosives used: gelignite 3,432 lb.; gelatine dynamite, 1,029 lb.; powder, 5,525 lb. Average number of men employed per month, 94.

Abattoir Quarry.—A new quarry was opened up during the latter part of the year on the west side of the abattoirs, facing Rozelle Bay. 8,260 cubic yards of rock and 8,240 cubic yards of ballast were excavated and tipped into the bay to form reclamation. Average number of men employed, 147. Explosives used, 1,446 lb. of gelignite.

No. 3 Harbour Trust Depot, Balmzin.—Work was proceeded with throughout the year providing additional storage accommodation. About 18,640 cubic yards of rock and soil were excavated, and this spoil was used in connection with extension of wharf, Glebe Island, Berths Nos. 2/3 and 4/5, Walsh Bay.

Wharfage Scheme, Jones' Bay.—The roadways and approaches to Jones' Bay were completed during the year, 14,370 square yards of road surface having been installed and tarred. The wood-blocked surface of No. 60 Jetty was top-dressed, an area of 11,500 square yards being covered.

At No. 19 Berth 2 600 cubic yards of submarine rock were excavated under contract by H. Scott. Submarine Rock Excavation.—6,870 cubic yards of submarine rock were excavated under contract by 11. Scott. Submarine Rock Excavation.—6,870 cubic yards of submarine rock were excavated by Trust's own plant from 17th October, 1919, to the 10th April, 1920, when plant had to be closed down owing to shortage of explosives. To excavate this rock 2,135 holes were drilled, equalling 15,660 lineal feet. Explosives used, 9½ tons. Detonators used, 6,550. Average cost per cubic yard, 14s. This work was carried out in confined space and in the midst of the shipping, and was subject to frequent interruptions.

Clark and Shark Islands.—General improvements were carried out at these islands, consisting of erection of concrete tank at Shark Island and re-making of footpaths at Clark Island.

Cremorne Wharf, Cremorne.—The temporary pontoon was removed and the original pontoon, which had been renovated, was placed in position. Carried out for and on behalf of Sydney Ferries, Limited.

Musgrace-street Wharf, Mosman.—The pontoon at this wharf was taken out for repairs and a temporary one placed in position. On completion of repairs the pontoon was put back into position. Carried out for and on behalf of Sydney Ferries, Limited.

No. 1 Ferry Jetty, Circular Quay.—The pontoon, which was taken out for overhaul, was repaired and replaced. During the interval, while pontoon was under repairs, a temporary one was substituted.

No. 8 Ferry Jetty, Circular Quay.—The pontoon was taken out, repaired and replaced. temporary pontcon was placed in position during overhaul.

No. 10 Berth, Woolloomooloo.—Extensive repairs were started at the latter end of this year, and good progress has been made. The extent of repairs to be done consists of renewing several caps and girders and all the decking.

Repairs to Wharves and Jetties.—Repairs and alterations were effected in 178 cases to various wharves and jetties, the principal being:-

Nos. 7 to 10 Berths, Pyrmont—repairs to decking. Nos. 6 and 7 Berths, Circular Quay—repairs to decking. No. 24, Darling Harbour—repairs to decking and sheathing. Manly Cargo Wharf, Manly—repairs to decking.

No. 4, Circular Quay—damage by s s. "Ventura" repaired.

Nos. 22 and 23, Darling Harbour—repairs to decking.

No. 47, Darling Harbour—repairs to decking.
No. 49, Darling Harbour—repairs to decking.
Repairs to Watson's Bay Ferry Wharf, Watson's Bay.

General repairs to Woolwich Ferry Wharf. Pile beacons, Upper Lane Cove, renewed.

Survey of Port.—Soundings have been taken during the year over various parts of the harbour and plans prepared, the principal being:-

Survey of Parramatta River from Ryde Bridge to Rydalmere, a distance of about 4 miles.

Duck River, from mouth of river to a distance about 3 miles up stream. Lane Cove River, from Mornington Wharf to Fig Tree Bridge, a distance of about 1 mile.

The Eastern and Western channels.

Frequent soundines were also taken in connection with the dredging.

Harbour Lights.—The acetylene lights on buoys, beacons, and light towers, have been maintained All the buoys have been lifted periodically and overhauled. in good order.

The following quantities of timber have been used during the year in wharf construction:—

BUILDING CONSTRUCTION, &c.

Berths 19, 20, and 21, Jones' Bay-Work at these extensive sheds, which had been stopped owing A large amount of additional work to settlement of foundations, was again taken in hand and completed. in connection with installation of machinery, was also carried out, and is now practically completed.

Nos. 2 and 3 Berth Sheds, Walsh Bay.—These double-storey premises which have been in hand for someconsiderable time, but were held up owing to shortage of materials, are now well in hand.

225 feet length of jetty shed is now practically completed and ready for use.

Nos. 4 and 5 Berth Sheds, Walsh Bay.—There are similar sheds to these on Nos. 2 and 3 Jetty, and work was stopped here for similar reasons, but is now in progress again, about 170 feet being now practically completed and ready for use.

No. 11 Berth, Mi ler's Point.—This new cargo shed, which was nearly completed last year, was completed early in the year, and now forms part of wharf premises controlled by Dalgety and Company, Limited.

No. 10 Berth, Hitter's Point.—Extensive additions to existing shed accommodation at this jetty were commenced and, with remodelling of old buildings, will make this berth in every respect an up-to-date one, and at a minimum of cost.

Nos. 8 and 9 Berths, Walsh Bay.—The whole of these extensive cargo sheds and offices are being repainted by the Trust's workmen. The cost of carrying out the work, which will cost about £2,000, will be paid by the lessees.

Pottinger-street Viaduct Stores.—Building work in connection with the stores under this viaduct was proceeded with as far as possible, but was retarded very much through shortage of cement supply and is now completely stopped for same reason.

No. 36 Berth Shed, Darling Harbour.—This single-story shed, built for use of North Coast Steamship Company, Limited, which was well in hand last year, was completed early in the year and handed over to the company for general use.

No. 1 Berth, P. and O. Steam Navigation Company, Circular Quay.—Extensive alterations and additions to the charge sheds were carried out during the year, giving about one-third more cargo storage space. A complete rearrangement of general offices was also made; the situation being in a much more central position. The whole of the old and new work was thoroughly renovated and painted throughout.

No. 2 Berth, Orient Steamship Company, Limited, Circular Quay.—Important alterations and additions and remodelling of the cargo sheds on these premises are now in hand. These mainly consist in the widening of a large portion of existing cargo shed, the erection of a large two-storey office block, tho installation of a new sanitary block, and the demolition of the southern end of present buildings to allow of roadway being widened, this particular part at present being a serious block to safe working of vehicular traffic.

No. 3 Berth, Cargo Sheds, Circular Quay.—These sheds were cut back by 100 feet at southern end to allow of the remodelling of roadway and ferry jetty at this point. The whole of the sheds were thoroughly repaired, painted, and generally put in first-class order.

Manly Cargo Wharf, Manly.—Additions to cargo shed at this wharf at Manly were carried out,

giving about double shed area that previously existed.

No. 6 Berth, Pyrmont.—This shed, used by J. Lysaght, Ltd., for storing of galvanised iron, wire netting, etc., and which was destroyed by fire, has been rebuilt, but with about one-third more added Construction—timber framing, hardwood weatherboards, and roof covering fibrolite floor space. corrugated sheets.

Nos. 8, 9, and 10 Berth Sheds, Darling Harbour (North Coast S.N. Co., Ltd.)—The whole of roofs of these sheds was renewed by stripping off old galvanised iron and replacing with fibrolite sheets, and providing all new gutters and down nipes. The maize floor outside was entirely renewed, additions made to shed on No. 9 Berth, and posts and girders overhauled and a number renewed, and trachyte bare blocks put in where required. The work of strengthening floors by means of extra joists and steel trussing is now in hand, but has been delayed owing to non-delivery of timber required.

Newcastle and Hunter River Steamship Company, Limited -Roofs of these extensive sheds, which were in very bad order, have been stripped, and gutters, downpipes, and iron entirely renewed.

No. 11 Berth, Woolloomooloo.—Work has been in progress here for some time, but owing to delay in removal of road metal bins belonging to the State Metal Quarries, only small progress was made. A fair amount of progress has, however, been made with the Health Department's portion of work, but this cannot be completed owing to shortage of cement.

Head Office Alterations.—Considerable alterations have been made to various rooms owing to rearrangement of work of staff, the principal work being carried out ou fourth floor in the converting of long room into three offices for legal staff, and the converting of three rooms on third floor into one large room for use of Engineer-in-Chief's clerks.
