Dear Sir.

The Annual Report of the Police Department of this State for the year 1926 is submitted as required by the Police Regulations.

The statistics compiled respecting the number of cases dealt with by the Courts for the year ended Position in 31st December last show that there has been an increase in the number of cases of serious crime and also reme, in the total number of all classes of offences. The more serious offences (which include offences against the person, offences against property with violence, and against property without violence) during last year exceeded the total for 1925 by 1,269. From the statistics for the State, as set out below, it will be seen that the total number of cases under all headings for 1926 was 14,298 more than that for 1925.

The Police Authorities found 1926 an exceptionally busy year. The volume of police business has Further shown a further heavy increase in all directions. This is demonstrated by the following particulars:—

The volume of police business has Further increase in departmental business.

The number of papers dealt with in the Inspector General's office was 281,627, as compared with 256,718 during 1925. The revenue collected under the Motor Traffic Act easily exceeded £1,000,000 the actual total being £1,120,060, as against £866,278 for 1925.

It was found necessary to provide on the Estimates for a further increase in the strength of the Necessity for additional Police Force, 13 extra commissioned officers and 50 additional constables being provided for.

#### Criminal Statistics for the State Generally.

Full details of the number of cases brought before the Police Courts of the State are furnished in Appendix A Appendix A of this report. The figures contained in that Appendix cover all cases dealt with by the Police either by arrest or summons, and the subjoined table affords a comparison with the figures for 1923,

The total increase of 14,298 cases is mainly accounted for under the following headings:—Assault, maliciously injuring property, simple larceny, supposed stolen goods in custody, forgery, uttering, drunkenness, using bad language, and breaches of the following Acts:—Gaming and Betting Act, Industrial Arbitration Act, Land and Income Tax Act, Liquor Act, Metropolitan Traffic Act (and Regulations), Motor Traffic Act (and Regulations), and the Weights and Measures Act. The number of offences under the Motor Traffic Act and Regulations alone accounted for an increase of 7,891 cases, and this fact is no doubt due to the huge increase in motor traffic and to the additional activity on the part of the Police in their endeavour to reduce the number of fatalities and serious accidents.

Appendix A1.

In Appendix A1 a graph will be found illustrating, for each year since 1905, the increase in the number of persons proceeded against, the growth of population, and the gradual increase of the strength of the Police Force.

Serious crime.

During 1926 there was an increase of 428 in the number of serious cases of crime reported and published in the *Police Gazette*, the total being 8,554, as compared with 8,126 for 1925. The main increases were under the following headings:—Murder, 7; rape and assaults, 11; bank robberies, 8; assault and robbery, 10; abduction, 10; uttering forged cheques, false pretences, frauds, &c., 157; burglaries, &c., 118; watches, jewellery, &c., stolen, 213; deserted wives and children, 46.

Decreases took place under various headings, the principal being:—Attempted arson, 17; man-slaughter, 9; maliciously wounding, 26; horse stealing, 53.

Appendix B. Juvenile crime.

Particulars respecting the number of juvenile offenders and offences of a serious nature committed by them in 1926 are furnished in Appendix B. It will be seen from the information contained therein that the amount of crime committed by young offenders shows a serious increase.

Inquests.

The total number of inquests held during 1926 was 1,964. Of this number, 1,739 were on dead bodies (the total number of bodies being 1,813), and 225 on fires.

Breaches of Section 463 of the Crimes Act, 1900.

Section 463 of the Crimes Act provides for release of offenders on license under certain conditions. Breaches of this section occurred in 16 cases, as compared with 33 for the previous year.

First offenders released under the Crimes Act.

The number of first offenders discharged under the Crimes Act was 531, an increase of 103 over the figures for 1925.

Wife and child desertion.

The number of cases of wife and child desertion reported was 1,364, as against 1,318 for the previous year.

Extraditions.

There were 8 cases of extradition from New South Wales, 7 being to New Zealand and 1 to South Africa.

In addition to these figures, there were 11,691 cases of applications for order of Court, and 4,994 cases of non-compliance with orders.

The main increases were under similar headings to those under which increases are shown in the criminal statistics for the State generally.

The chief decreases were under the following headings:—Assault on Police, breaking and entering, false pretences, uttering threatening or insulting words, travelling without paying fare, wilful disobedience on ship, breaches of Local Government Ordinances, breaches of the Police Offences Act and the Dog and Goat Act, and breaches of Commonwealth Acts.

#### Finger-prints.

The number of sets of finger-prints received during 1926 was 10,539, as against 10,037 sets dealt with in 1925; 3,895 were identified as of persons previously convicted, an increase of 71 on the figures for the previous year. In 8 cases of housebreaking and stealing, finger-prints constituted the main evidence. In 21 other cases of housebreaking the finger-prints of the culprits were identified, but the accused admitted the offences and this obviated the necessity for giving evidence at Court respecting the prints.

In all, 593 articles were examined in the Finger-print Branch during the year, while 257 visits to various places in the city, suburbs and country were made by members of the Finger-print Staff for the purpose of obtaining evidence in connection with serious crimes.

The bodies of ten unknown deceased persons were identified as a result of the examination of their finger-prints, no other means of identification being available.

The Prisons Department supplied 730 photographs of criminals, and these were circulated for Police information; 6,600 copies were distributed to the various Australian States and New Zealand, while 25,200 were supplied to the city and country Police in New South Wales.

From other States of the Commonwealth and New Zealand, 2,394 photographs were received. The work of the Finger-print Branch continues to show a steady increase.

### Water Police, Sydney.

The number of passengers carried by the ferries on the harbour during the year was over 43,000,000. In eight instances assistance was rendered to the crews of sailing boats which had capsized, and in this way 55 persons were rescued. Assistance was also given to several motor-boats in distress. bodies were recovered from the harbour, in some cases extensive dragging operations being necessary. Water Police also assisted in an endeavour to recover bodies of persons drowned from vessels outside the Heads.

Plain-clothes Police have been active in dealing with pillage of cargo from vessels and on wharves with good results. During the year 29 arrests were effected and a fair amount of property recovered. Seven small fires occurred on vessels and wharves in the port.

### Water Police, Newcastle.

During 1926 the activities of the Water Police at Newcastle were well maintained and assistance rendered on numerous occasions to the shipping of the port. Four bodies were recovered from the harbour during the year.

#### Women Special Constables.

The four women special constables employed in the Metropolitan District carried out their duties efficiently. As a result of their activities, over 100 juvenile offenders and neglected and uncontrollable children were brought before the Children's Court and dealt with. Assistance in the form of shelter, food and clothing, and, in some cases, employment, was rendered to a number of persons.

#### Metropolitan Licensing Inspection.

At the end of 1926, the total number of hotels in the Metropolitan Licensing District was 530, or 2 Hotels. more than at the end of 1925. The increase of 2 was accounted for by new licenses.

Continued improvement has been manifested in the class of hotel premises in the district. Applications for rebuilding and material alterations totalled 77. Of these, 72 were granted, 1 refused, and In addition to these applications, a large amount of rebuilding and improvement was voluntarily arranged for by owners of licensed premises.

There were 122 spirit merchants' licenses in force in the district at the end of the year, a decrease of 5 on the previous year's figures. Billiard licenses, however, showed a corresponding increase, the number on the 31st December, 1926, being 162, as against 157 for 1925. The number of Australian wine licenses in the district remained unaltered, viz., 165. Similarly, the number of packet licenses was the same as during 1925, viz., 10.

Generally speaking, the quality of liquor sold was of a satisfactory standard.

Particulars of convictions under the Liquor Act obtained in the Metropolitan Licensing District Appendix C. (including convictions against Australian wine licensees) will be found in Appendix C.

#### Traffic Branch.

Further expansion has taken place in the work of the Traffic Branch. The revenue collected on account of registration of public vehicles and tax on motor vehicles amounted to no less than £1,120,060, account of registration of public venteres and tax on motor venteres amounted to no less than £1,120,000, as compared with £866,278 received during 1925. The increase represented by the year's operations was thus over a quarter of a million pounds. The total number of motor vehicles registered or licensed on the 31st December last was 156,073, the total on the same date in 1925 being 123,591.

This increase in revenue is practically wholly due to the large number of additional motor registrations.

At the end of 1926 there were 78 motor vehicles in the service of the Police Department, made up Departmental as follows:—Seven motor cars, 9 divisional patrol cars, 36 motor cycles, 4 general patrol cars, and 1 motor vehicles. truck in use in the Metropolitan District, and 2 motor cars, 1 motor patrol, and 18 motor cycles in use in country districts.

Experience has demonstrated that in many areas Police patrol work can be carried out with greater Motorisation of patrol work. efficiency and economy by the use of motor vehicles, and during the year the Government decided to provide for the employment of additional motor cars and motor cycles in outlying suburbs and in country districts where it was found that such vehicles were suitable for police requirements.

With a view to more efficient control of motor traffic in the Metropolitan area and especially as Public Safety regards excessive speeding, a Police Public Safety Bureau was established and is rendering excellent service. Bureau.

Further details as to the work of the Traffic Branch, details of the revenue collected, and figures Appendix . respecting street accidents are contained in Appendix D.

#### Miscellaneous.

Although there were a number of industrial disputes during the year, no serious breaches of the Industrial disputes. peace occurred.

On the 1st May, 1926, the forty-four hour week principle was applied to the Police service, and each Forty-four hour week. member of the force now, in each week, normally performs forty-four hours' duty.

A Drug Bureau has been established at Police Headquarters, where all information relating to the Drug Bureau traffic in cocaine and drugs of a like nature is collected and filed for reference.

#### Missing Friends.

The number of inquiries received during 1926 for missing friends was 2,472, as against 2,339 for the previous year. The number of persons traced was 1,580, the number for 1925 being 1,600. Included in the total number of inquiries were 1,212 from various parts of the British Empire, including Great Britain and the Commonwealth, and 170 from foreign countries.

### Acts of Bravery.

During 1926 there were a number of incidents in which courage was displayed by members of the

force in the discharge of their duties.

At Circular Quay, in June, a constable pluckily stopped a runaway horse and waggon and the matter was duly brought under the notice of the Royal Humane Society, with the result that the constable was awarded a certificate of merit.

At Newtown Bridge, two horses attached to a lorry bolted and were stopped on the brink of an

excavation by a constable on traffic duty on the bridge.

At Circular Quay, in October, a man jumped into the harbour. A constable dived in and rescued him with considerable difficulty. In this case also, the Royal Humane Society has awarded a certificate

At North Sydney, a constable arrested an armed man who had fired a revolver at a female. At

the hearing of the case, the presiding magistrate complimented the constable on his courage.

At Waterloo, a boy, while bathing in a waterhole, got into difficulties. A constable, without waiting to remove his clothing, jumped in and rescued him. It is understood that the constable has been recommended for a medal for his bravery.

#### Establishment.

Appendix E.

On the 31st December, 1926, the Police Force, including 21 trackers, numbered 2,997, the authorised strength on that date (exclusive of trackers) being 3,056. Details as to the number of men in the various ranks in the Police Force are set out in Appendix E.

#### Appointments.

The number of applications for appointment to the Police Service received during the year was 1,055, but only 182 of these applications were successful, 606 candidates being rejected for various reasons, while 263 did not pass the prescribed medical examination. Four men did not proceed with their applications. Further, 654 men made personal inquiry with a view to Police employment, but on account of physical disabilities or other reasons did not complete formal applications.

#### Transfers.

Transfers to more congenial climates were granted in a number of cases as follows:—Six men from the Dubbo district, seven men from the Broken Hill district, and fourteen from the Riverina district.

#### Police Buildings.

During the past twelve months several new Police buildings were erected at various centres, and additions and repairs carried out at a number of Police stations. There are still, however, many places throughout the State at which new Police premises are required, and also many centres where repairs, alterations and additions are necessary to existing Police buildings. The large and increasing amount paid annually for rental of premises for Police purposes adequately shows the necessity for the erection of Government buildings, and in view of the number of places at which such a requirement is necessary and the unsuitableness for Police stations of many of the present rented premises, it is most desirable that as large a sum as possible be provided on the Public Works Fund Vote for Police buildings. At places where no land has been set apart for Police purposes, sites are being obtained as funds become available.

### Health of Police.

During 1926 the number of Police absent from duty through sickness was somewhat higher than the number for the previous year.

### Ambulance and Life-saving Certificates.

Police recruits undergo a full course of ambulance instruction before their appointments are

confirmed. They also receive instruction in the methods of life-saving.

On the 31st December, 1926, 2,097 members of the force held ambulance certificates and 491 possessed life-saving certificates, a number also holding the Royal Life-saving Society's Medallion.

#### New South Wales Police Band.

During the year there were numerous applications for the services of the Police Band at functions of a charitable or patriotic nature. Where the occasion justified it and Police duties made it practicable, the services of the Band were made available. At a concert held in aid of the South Sydney Hospital, at which the Police Band attended, the sum of approximately £800 was raised.

#### Conduct of Police.

The general conduct of the Police force continues to be maintained at a high standard, and Police duties have been efficiently performed.
